St. Augustine Indian Mission is housed in a very non-descript building with only a small wooden sign naming the school. But as you walk into the building you get a sense that this is a very special place to those who attend the school each day. The halls and walls are filled with the students' art work. Walking in the halls a visitor would see and hear the children busy at their desks, studying hard and participating in their classroom discussions. Pete Soby, our video photographer, is very good at persuading the students and teachers to share with him how they feel and what they think about their school.

"When you walk in the building there is something unique about St. Augustine's; the children and teachers really care about each other," said Second grade teacher, Paula Kuebler.

"The students exhibit warm and loving hearts and unsolicited kindness daily, they are eager to learn and do whatever we ask of them," shared Sheryl Ashley, 5th grade teacher.

Principal Don Blackbird says that every day is a unique day; you never know what's going to come through the door with the children. "They bring stuff in with them, things they have dealt with at home or things they dealt with the night before. When they come through the door the first thing we do is make sure they know someone cares for them."

With this Trumpet Call I have now gone through an entire year of writing to you. It has been a tremendous joy to connect with you and to get to know the people who make St. Augustine Indian Mission possible. A year ago, I had no idea how

many people felt a deep love for the people of the Omaha and Winnebago reservations and who shared a commitment to furthering our efforts of educating children here. Our staff, benefactors, organizations who work with us, and service groups are only some of the people who help carry on the legacy of St. Katharine Drexel. I want to highlight a few of these.

Among the most dedicated supporters of the Mission are the Missionary Benedictine sisters. In the last Trumpet Call and at our recent Circle of Dreams event, we highlighted Sr. Frances. She is one of the four Missionary Benedictines who work on our staff. They have been a part of St. Augustine for over 50 years. From teaching our school children, to reaching out to elderly parishioners, to praying for all of us, the Sisters are a big part of what we do. They are continuing the service of religious women that began with St. Katharine and her order, the Blessed Sacrament Sisters, who founded the Mission in 1909.



The many service groups who visit continue to be a big part of our community. In the summer, we have groups of up to 100 high school kids. These students will all tell you that they receive more than they give. Their visits provide the people in our community the opportunity to share their experiences and traditions with people from around the country. This interaction between groups creates a bond that benefits everyone.



We have come to the end of another school year. Soon summer will be upon us and the children will be running free and playing outdoors enjoying the natural beauty here in Winnebago and the surrounding countryside. We are truly blessed to have such a beautiful homeland.

Even though the school doors will soon close for the summer that does not mean the work of the Mission slows down. While our primary focus has always been our educational ministry to the children and families of the Winnebago and Omaha reservation, we also focus on helping the communities with other needs as well.

Some of our other ministries include hosting service groups during the school year and summer who come to learn about the Native American Culture and the Catholic Church's Social Justice teachings. These service group volunteers come from across the United States and range in age from high school students to adult professionals. The services the volunteers provide run a spectrum from summer learning projects for local community children, to working with local housing improvement projects, to special summer ministry to help local elders with basic home maintenance and improvements. Many of our volunteers also spend time helping at the local food pantry which serves three reservation communities and our local thrift store that provides quality items at very low cost. These items include clothing, home goods and furnishings as well as basic toiletries and cleaning supplies.
